Chapter 1: Strings and Tuning



Ukuleles have 4 strings. Most are tuned to the notes G C E A. (important note: Strings are numbered from the bottom, so A=1, E=2, C=3, G=4)


When you are holding the uke in the playing position, the string closest to your head is G, the next string is C, the next is E, and the string closest to the floor is A.

There are many ways to tune a ukulele, but I recommend a clip-on tuner for speed and ease of use!



Chapter 2: Intro to Chord Diagrams and the A Chords

This is the way your fingers are numbered followed by an A chord and an Am (A minor) chord.



To form an A chord, we begin by placing our 2nd finger, of our fretting hand (the left hand for right handed players), on the 2nd fret (just behind the fret wire) of the G (4th) string. Next, we place our 1st finger on the 1st fret of the C (3rd) string. Then, we simply strum all of the strings!

To form an Am chord, we do the same, but we don't cover the C string.

Here are 3 basic strumming patterns to get you started.

- 1. All steady downstrokes- \downarrow \downarrow \downarrow
- 2. Alternate down and up- $\downarrow\uparrow$ $\downarrow\uparrow$
- 3. Down, Up, Down with a pause- $\downarrow\uparrow\downarrow$ $\downarrow\uparrow\downarrow$

Now, let's play our first song!

This is my favorite one chord song called 'All Around the Kitchen!' The whole tune is sung over the Am chord!

All Around the Kitchen

(Traditional)

CHORUS

All around the kitchen, cock-a-doodle doodle Doo.

All around the kitchen, cock-a-doodle doodle Doo.

Verse 1

Then you stop right there. Cock-a-doodle doodle do.

Put your hand in the air.

Cock-a-doodle doodle Doo.


Then you wave it all around.

Cock-a-doodle doodle Doo.

CHORUS

(At 'stop right there' of each verse, stop your strumming while you give your audience their command. Continue making up verses with fun things to do for each!)

Chapter 3: C, D, and G Chords



To form a C chord, begin by placing your 3rd finger on the 3rd fret of the A (1st) string. Then strum. Easy!

To play a D chord, begin by placing your 2nd finger on the 2nd fret of the G (4th) string. Next, place your 3rd finger on the 2nd fret of the C (3rd) string. Finally, place your 4th finger on the 2nd fret of the E (2nd) string. Then strum.

A G chord is formed by placing your 1st finger on the 2nd fret of the C (3rd) string. Next, place your 2nd finger on the 2nd fret of the A (1st) string. Finally, place your 3rd finger on the 3rd fret of the E (2nd) string. Strum away!

Let's play another tune!

Chapter 4: the E Chord



To play an E chord, we are moving our D chord up 2 frets. The catch is that we'll need to cover that A (1st) string, so begin by placing your 1st finger on the 2nd fret of the A string. Next, place your 2nd finger on the 4th fret of the G (4th) string. Then, place your 3rd finger on the 4th fret of the G (3rd) string. Finally, place your 4th finger on the 4th fret of the G (2nd) string. Now strum!

Here's another fun tune!
